Does the program offer dedicated nurse navigators to enhance the patient experience?	Yes. We offer dedicated nurse navigators to help patients and families through what can be a complex process. The BMT-specialized nurse navigator provides efficiency, convenience and peace of mind.		
Do any other specialized professionals support your transplant patients?	Absolutely. Our entire team specializes in care for cancerous and noncancerous blood disorders. Some uncommon, dedicated roles include our dedicated oncology psychologist and dedicated pre- and posttransplant nurse coordinators, as well as specially trained social workers, financial coordinators, dietitians, physical therapists, palliative care specialists, fertility specialists and nurse practitioners.

What types of stem cell transplants does the program perform?	We perform: Autologous (your own cells) Allogeneic (donor cells) Syngeneic (identical twins) Cord blood Nonmyeloablative/reduced intensity Haploidentical (half-matched)		
Does the program offer support for finding matched donors?	Yes. We find matches through the National Marrow Donor Program. We have been a member since 1995.		
Does the program offer clinical trials for patients with cancerous and noncancerous blood disorders?	Yes. We provide nationally recognized, leading-edge treatments through clinical trials initiated by our own physicians. Trials include groundbreaking advances in immunotherapy and CAR T-cell therapy. Does the program offer staff to answer your questions before and after treatment?	Yes. Our specially trained BMT and cellular therapy staff assist patients through the complete journey, including specially designed education classes for patients and their caregivers. In addition, we provide a symptom management clinic to support you before and after transplant and at every step in between.		
Will the same team treat you before, during and after transplant?	Yes. Consistency and continuity are very important to us and to our patients.		
Will the program team collaborate with your local and/or primary care providers?	Of course. We are happy to team with primary care providers and local oncologists to together give patients the best possible treatment close to home.		
Does the program offer specialized survivorship care to support your long-term follow-up needs?	Yes. A team of physicians, nurses and financial counselors is dedicated to BMT patients' long-term follow-up care needs. Through our survivorship clinic, we are here for you to provide care not only for blood disorders, but for the effects of treatment over time.

Does the program offer education materials, classes and support groups?	Yes. Our dedicated educators teach patient and caregiver education classes. We offer the Brandmeyer Patient Resource Center for education, staffed by an oncology nurse to help identify specific materials. Turning Point: The Center for		
	Hope and Healing offers education and support programs at no charge to patients and families facing chronic illness.		
	We also provide our staff with ongoing educational and credentialing opportunities to ensure they are consistently qualified to provide patients with gold-standard care.		
Will my insurance cover transplant at this center?	For many patients, the answer is yes.		
	Each patient has a dedicated financial counselor who specializes in assisting patients in determining their coverage for transplant.		
	We have been Medicareapproved since 1977.		
Does the program provide information on housing for out-of-town patients?	We offer a travel consultant and concierge service to provide information on travel arrangements and lodging.		
	One lodging option is the American Cancer Society's Hope Lodge, free lodging for adult cancer patients receiving treatment out of state.		
Can I speak with other patients who have had their transplants here?	We offer a formalized mentorship program to connect current and former patients and caregivers. Many former patients and caregivers volunteer to share information and provide support.
